County updating mitigation plan

The jurisdictions of Adams County, Corning, Prescott, Nodaway, Southwest Valley Schools, and CHI Health Mercy Hospital are starting the process of updating their multi-hazard mitigation plan.

Mitigation plans identify and implement strategies to eliminate or, when this is not possible, minimize the effects that the hazard can have on people or property. The mitigation plan is based on hazard analysis and risk assessment includes profiles of affected jurisdictions. The plan establishes mitigation goals and objectives and outlines strategies for hazard elimination or hazard effect reduction.

Surveys have been created to gain information and perspectives of members of the Adams County community and partners who provide service in Adams County.

The first survey is designed to facilitate a strong planning process so that the hazard mitigation plan is useful to the county and jurisdictions in the county and that it meets state and Federal Emergency Management Agency require-

The topic for the second survey are the types of actions commonly done to address hazards such as the ones in the first

"You do not need to have extensive knowledge about hazard and disasters to participate," Adams County Emergency


Boswell finds inspiration in people, particularly children.



And though she's now based in Portland, she credits her roots in Adams County and her teachers in Coming as part of her suc-

"I wrote my first picture book in the seventh grade in Corning," she said. "It was in LeAnn Morris's talented and gifted class."

Boswell's story, "The Very Big Nose" (of Annabel Rose), gave her "a real sense of accomplishment that I can still conjure today." She soon began believing she would grow up to become an author, artist, actress, or pibecause of the creativity and freedom she





found in Corning.

"Growing up in a small town in Iowa granted me the chance to try all these things and I continue to love how different disciplines and mediums feed each other," she said.

Boswell found another mentor in former Corning English teacher Pete Nett who had his students write in their journals every day. Boswell said that practice

School audit shows revenue increase

Van Maanen, Sietstra, Meyer and Nikkel, PC, certified public accountants released an audit report Feb. 1 on the Corning Community School District.

Financial highlights

The district's revenues totaled \$8,994,491 for the year ended June 30, 2020, a 5.2 percent increase from the prior year. Expenses for the district operations for the year ended June 30, 2020, totaled \$8,938,668, a 7.3 percent increase from the prior year. The increase in revenues is due primarily to an increase in state aid and property valuations. The increase in expenses is due primarily to instruction and support serv-

Audit findings

Van Maanen, Sietstra, Meyer and Nikkel, PC reported three findings related to the receipt and expenditure of taxpayer funds. They are found on pages 59 through 60 of this report. The findings address issues such as segregation of duties, variances in enrollment certified to the Iowa Department of Education, and deficit fund balances. The auditors provided the district with recommendations to address each of the findings.

The school district's Board of Education

has a fiduciary responsibility to provide oversight of the school district's operations and financial transactions. Oversight is typically defined as the "watchful and responsible care" a governing body exercises in its fiduciary capacity.

Removing the 'isolation' from student quarantine housing

As she readied for an extended student move in and mandatory COVID-19 testing last July, residence life director Virginia Speight had her own move to complete. An Ames home renter the last four years, she let her lease expire, stored much of its content and moved with her Rottweiler, Jeanny, into the two-bedroom hall director's apartment in Oak-Elm residence hall, the designated quarantine residence for Iowa State students exposed COVID-19. Across the Richardson Court quadrangle, Linden Hall housed students isolated after a positive test for the

Speight and one of her associate directors, Susan Lammers, opted to serve as live-in advisors to the students temporarily assigned to one of the buildings. If they couldn't find the fix themselves, they knew who on campus could. They envisioned it as an after-five and weekends emergency assignwith the professionals tag-teaming

on a weekly cycle. Lammers moved into the Lin-Hall director's apartment when it was her

Speight said three factors steered their decision:

- · To protect all students. Iowa State would provide isolation and quarantine residences - and staff them 24/7.
- · So early in the pandemic, there were no best practices to draw from.
- She wouldn't place the department's hall directors or community advisors in the assignment.

"That's not what they signed up for," Speight said. "We talked briefly about contracting it out, but my brain kept asking, 'Virginia, is this something you could do provide a direct connect to the residence life piece given where you are personally and professionally?

"I knew I couldn't do it alone," she continued. "With the commitment Susan has to the institution, our students, the department - and her history here living on campus - I knew she was a partner I could count on. So I asked.

Lammers, who served

At approximately 2:56

a.m. Jan. 26, Adams

County deputies observed

as resident advisor in Oak-Elm as a Cyclone undergraduate and worked as an ISU hall director in 2006, ran through the same self-assessment.

"It came down to: Somebody has to do it, we have to serve these students," she said. "The word 'isolation' is so counter to what we believe in, in residence life. We're about community and helping people build connections. I kind of had to rewire my brain in the beginning, reframe how to help them feel connected."

The answer, Lammers said, was to answer every email, every phone call, no matter how big or small the question.

"Thank goodness Virginia and I had each other, because it was some of the most stressful work I've done in residence life," she said.

Busy start

In fact, it would be mid-September before the gig settled into a nights and weekends job. COVID-19 testing required for campus move in, and with more than 400 students getting tested daily Aug. 3-16, they

knew August would challenge them - and it did. During the peak weeks, about 130 students were assigned to isolation or quarantine (I/Q) campus housing. The work often was double that because in addition to serving their students, Speight and Lammers were serving parents, too. It was a time of nearly constant phone conversations.

"Parents on the phone

had one piece of information: My child has to move into quarantine housing," Lammers said. "They didn't know where to start, and we had to be dialed into that need, too,

for weeks. "I don't know how many times I said 'I'm not a doctor' or 'I'm not a public health official.' But that didn't mean I didn't need to reassure them that their student was safe and

being cared for."

Team effort

When residence students tested positive for COVID-19, Speight or Lammers received that information from the Thielen Student Health Center. They contacted each student to see who was moving home and who would stay on campus. Then they assigned rooms in

Oak-Elm or Linden to those staying, updated ISU Dining about meal delivery and alerted a team contracted from Nationwide to clean rooms, move students' belongings into them and deliver meals to their doors. Speight said students could bring as much as they wanted to their temporary room: TV, video game console, Netflix account,

Once students arrived. Speight or Lammers went to work, answering emails and phone calls and running errands: find a forgotten pillow back in their room, pick up a thermometer at Thielen Student Health Center, buy a box of tissues, retrieve a video game, pick up mail at their residence hall, whatever it took.

Other residence life staff assisted during the work day -Speight and Lammers still were trying to lead their residence life team, too - but after five, it fell to the one on duty.

"With every interaction, they needed to know we cared. They had to know that if they had a question at 2 a.m., that phone was going to be answered," Speight said. "You have to 'hug' them through every interaction you have with them on the phone. Or when you bring something to their door, not have a look on your face that says 'I know you have COVID."

Both leaders said they observed the change in students, from being angry or scared initially about their COVID exposure, to being grateful for the services they received.

"After 24 hours, they understood we were going to help them be successful in that space," Speight said.

Double duty Noteworthy effort

For her efforts, Virginia Speight received a COVID-19 Exceptional Effort Award in student support "for managing the logistics for students needing quarantine and isolation spaces,

comforting nervous students

and responding to anxious par-

About the time student numbers in isolation or quarantine started to ease a bit in mid-September, Lammers' family suffered a medical emergency. While she continued to do her first job, she no longer was able to share night/weekend duty with Speight on Richardson Court. So, Speight committed to finishing the semester herself, and the department brought in a temporary employee to help during the day with the administrative tasks of I/Q housing.


"It was for the students, but it also was for my staff," she said. "COVID is so stressful for my staff. The point of our work is to be attached, connected and engaged, so to have to stand down and step back is really hard for all of us."

Speight estimates she assisted 30-40 students at a time through October and then the numbers finally dropped off. For a couple weeks at semester break, the halls were empty. When students returned to Ames for winter session or jobs, one or two

typically lived in I/Q housing. The plan this spring? Speight will remain in her Oak-Elm apartment and continue to cover nights and weekends.

"We have very good administrative help during the day, and we have all our campus partners who back us up. Certainly, this is not something we could do. or did do, alone," Speight said. "We hope our numbers stay low, but with fall semester behind us, I do feel better about what to expect for spring. We'll make it work."


Headquarters. Both of these works can be seen on her website, www.addieboswell.com.





The greening of winter

As true winter has arrived and The Virus grinds on, with no Calvary riding to the rescue, one seeks some bright spot. Fortunately, those who produce seed catalogs have anticipated this predicament and have been filling our mail-

After last year's overambitious garden, I had resolved to trim back my garden to something more suitable for the needs of two people and a few friends, and instead of 43 tomato plants, maybe just a dozen or so, but after delving into the offerings from Seed Savers Exchange I am feeling a certain weakness in my resolve. I have never met a tomato variety I did not like.

A few standbys I am committed to, such as the tasty and abundant Mexican Midget, the

vorful black tomato Paul Robeson, and Lemon Boy, but without going whole hog in the number of plants, I believe my focus this year will be on growing large tomatoes, something I never really cared about, but think it might be an interesting challenge.

Seed Savers Exchange is located in Deborah, Iowa, and is an original Iowa success story. Founded over 40 years ago, Seed Savers is now a repository of over 20,000 rare and significant varieties in their seed bank and orchards and occupies an important worldwide place in this endeavor.

Some years ago I participated in a garden tour of Northeast Iowa sponsored by Reiman Gardens in Ames and Seed Savers was one of our stops. Vegetable and flower gardening is one of those things done by hand and small a thousand acres of yellow dent corn for instance, and to see the beauty and perfection of the Seed Savers gardens and orchards, it is awe inspiring to consider the work and commitment involved. It is worth a visit if you are in that beautiful area of Iowa.

Seed catalogs are in the busi-

ness of selling their products and seek to draw you into their story and capture your interest to make you a customer, but most purveyors of seeds genuinely have a story worth telling. This is something that was first illuminated by Katherine White in the 1950s in a New Yorker magazine article entitled "Onward and Upward in the Garden" in which she reviewed the catalogs of nurserymen and seedsmen as sort of literary book reviews, a practice she continued for years. Katherine White was the the famous children's book "Charlotte's Web" about a pig named Wilbur and his friend Charlotte, a spider, a 1952 book that continues to captive the imagination of children today including Stella Rosenmeyer, age 8, the granddaughter of Karen Carlson of Atlantic.

Nowadays, I do most of the gardening out at the Old Morrison Place, west of town, but when we had a summer place on the coast of Maine, my wife had beautiful vegetable gardens and we ordered our seeds and supplies from Johnny's Selected Seeds in Winslow, Maine, another outstanding supplier of seeds and gardening wisdom, oriented to the far north gardener. A big success last year in our garden and kitchen was Swiss Chard and I am ordering all seven of Johnny's varieties this year.

Having torn out some grape

vines last year but leaving the support posts and wire in place, it is my intention to plant fruit trees in the espalier style on the wire and I am awaiting the Stark Brothers catalog to see what interesting varieties they have this year.

Another fine catalog is Baker Creek from Missouri and I hope to have their catalog soon since they always have new discoveries from around the world to try.

It seems hard to imagine now, but in two months another gardening season will be available to those of us who like to work the soil and experience the magic of what tiny seeds can produce, and while we continue to lay low to avoid The Virus we can have high hopes for the future and look forward to the return of the sun, the warmth, the fruits of our labors and shared times with our friends.

before it becomes law.

Thursday, and passed with a vote of 59-39. To become an amendment this bill must be passed by the Senate, which it was earlier in the day. It will now be placed on the ballot in 2022 and will be decided by a vote of the

people. HJR 5: The Life Amendment — The Life Amendment clarifies that the Iowa Constitution provides no right to an abortion. It doesn't end abortion in Iowa it only states that abortion is not a right granted by our Constitution. On Wednesday, it came before the House. We debated until 9:30 p.m. at which time the resolution passed with a vote of 55-44. Like all resolutions it must pass both Houses and then be passed again in the next legislative General Assembly (2023-2024). The final say will belong to the people of Iowa, as this will have to be passed by popular Second lowest unemployment in nation

Iowa's unemployment rate is now at 3.1 percent, which ties Vermont for second lowest in the nation. Only Nebraska and South Dakota have lower unemployment rates, both tying at 3 percent. Our rate of 3.1 percent is near our pre-COVID levels of 2.8 percent, and our unemployment rate is far

better than the national

average of 6.7 percent.

Senate bills are wrong for Iowa

To the editor:

Senate File 159 and Senate File 160 moved quickly through the Iowa Legislature. Neither bill is good for Iowa schools and rural economics.

SF 159 passed in the Iowa Senate and will now move to the House. If passed in both Houses, public money will be diverted to non-public schools. There is no rationale for the action. It introduces vouchers, expansion of charter schools, change open enrollment dates, enrollment counting practices, and redirecting other monies that have been earmarked for teachers and teacher leaders. The Legislature would like you to believe that it won't impact our area and the cost factor is minor. Perhaps not this year, but this legislation can be expanded in subsequent years. Iowa has open enrollment which has been in place for many years; there is no need to expand further. Talk to your local board and superintendents about this issue; they don't support it either. It's wrong for Iowa. Please contact your Iowa House of Representative member urging him/her to defeat the bill.

SF 160 was passed by both the Iowa Senate and House of Representatives on Jan. 28, 2021, and signed by Gov. Reynolds in just a little over a week. SF 160 cuts to the heart of a school board's local control, a "sacred" concept in Iowa for decades. School boards oversee the working of their districts. Everyone believe students should be in school if safe. The safety of the staff and students is the responsibility of the local school board. This bill overrides the board's responsibility. Local boards know the community circumstances in which they serve. This legislation usurped the local School Board's authority to make those decisions placing it in the Governor's Office and the Department of Education.

It is now law and it's wrong for Iowa. Similar legislation has been proposed in neighboring states. Neither bill is good for Iowa's students or public education nor were they supported by boards, administrators, or educators. SF 159 will damage the public education system Iowa has been proud to provide. SF 160 damaged the premise of local control. Both are wrong for Iowa. Remain alert. The intention is to move this quickly before most of the public can react. Please ask questions. Contact your House of Representatives mem-







The annual cattle inventory was released on Jan. 29 and figures were as expected. The feeder cattle outside the feed yards available are down 25,562 from last year. We are probably going to see a market as expected which could be better in the third quarter than in the first two quarters of the year.

As of last week ethanol production was down 9.3 percent versus last year. There were large sales of corn to China since the first of the year. ADM reported China bought roughly 200 million gallons of U.S. ethanol for the first half of 2021. That would top the 198 million gallon record that U.S. sold to China for all of 2016. We need China to continue purchasing corn and ethanol if we are to keep these ethanol plants going.

The Russian government has formally approved a proposal to impose a higher export tax on wheat starting March 1. The government approved a 50 Euro per tonne wheat export tax starting March 1 to June 30 compared to the 25 Euro per tonne tax set for Feb. 15 to March 1.

There was a big reaction to the selloff in the stock market on Jan. 27. This is partially due to people taking money and trying to reassess their positions, plus it was a volume contract high day in the S&P. The full moon may have also played a part here

I think we will continue to have a lot of volatility in the grain and livestock markets - big moves up and down. One thing I want to caution is the huge open interest by the funds in a lot of commodities. Daily weekly moves can be highly exaggerated by fund positioning, either to get out or in, the market. Be careful what you wish for, either way it could happen.

ORDINANCE NO. 473 AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE CODE OF ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF CORNING, IOWA. 2014, BY AMENDING

PROVISIONS PERTAINING TO COLLECTION OF SOLID WASTE, CHAPTER 106

BE IT ENACTED by the City Council of the City of Corning,

SECTION 1. SECTIONS MODIFIED. Sections 106.05, of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Corning, Iowa, 2014, is changed and is hereby adopted to read as follows:

106.05 BULKY RUBBISH.

Bulky rubbish which is too large or heavy to be collected in the normal manner of other solid waste may be collected by the collector in accordance with current procedures. SECTION 1. SECTIONS

MODIFIED. Sections 106.08, of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Corning, Iowa, 2014, is changed and is hereby adopted to read as follows: 106.08 COL-LECTION FEES. The collection and disposal of solid waste as provided by this chapter are declared to be beneficial to the property served or eligible to be served and there shall be levied and collected fees therefor the following mandatory fees, collected monthly.

1. Rate. From each residential household at a convenient place of pickup a charge shall be made of \$27.88 per month for one collection each week of one (1) ninety-six (96) gallon wheeled tote container of garbage and refuse, except for yard waste, and a charge shall be made of \$24.09 per month for one collection each week of one (1) thirty-five (35) gallon wheeled tote container of garbage and refuse, except for yard waste. This amount may be modified or changed from time to time by resolution of the Council when the number of residents or landfill tipping fees change, when the surcharge for fuel changes, or when a consumer price index change is made in the City's garbage contract fee. All tote rates include a curb side recycle tote of 96 gal-

2. Payment of Bills. All fees are due and payable as part of a combined service account under the same terms and conditions as payment for water, gas and electric service, as established by the Utility Board of Trustees.

3. Delinquent Fees. If any account is not paid within thirty days after the due date, it is considered delinquent and the Clerk shall certify to the County Treasurer for collection in the same manner as taxes all such delinquent accounts over three months old on June 1 each year together with a special collection fee of \$5.00 due to the City in addition to the delinquent fees for the services. The provisions contained in Section 98.08 relating to lien notices shall also apply in the event of a delinquent account.

(Ord. 319 - Dec. 99 Supp.) SECTION 2. REPEALER. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

SECTION 3. SEVERABIL-ITY CLAUSE. If any section, provision or part of this ordinance shall be adjudged invalid or unconstitutional, such adjudication shall not affect the validity of the ordinance as a whole or any section, provision or part thereof not adjudged invalid or unconstitutional.

SECTION 4. WHEN EF-FECTIVE. This ordinance shall be in effect from and after its final passage, approval and publication as provided by law.

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

This week's schedule includes a road game Feb. 2 with Bedford and the Timberwolves hosting Sidney on Feb. 4 and Lenox on Feb. 6.




